ASHSL – INTERIM

Introduction

Many librarians suffered from professional isolation in the early days of health care libraries in Scotland. Tribute must be paid to the pioneering spirit of Toni Bunch, the first professional librarian to be appointed in the Scottish Health Service in 1965, for arranging informal meetings at which newly appointed librarians could become acquainted and share experiences. This ad-hoc group increased from twenty in 1970 to forty in 1974. The number of appointments continued to increase, particularly in the nursing discipline. Many problems had been identified at these early meetings, including lack of recognition, inadequate financing, salary gradings which would attract only newly qualified librarians and no career structure. The need for a professional body which would represent and promote health care libraries and librarians working in health care disciplines was apparent. The best way forward would be to form a properly constituted official group which would be recognised by the Scottish Home and Health Department. This was achieved in 1975 when the Association of Scottish Health Sciences Librarians was formally constituted as an independent organisation.

At the AGM of 1976 it was decided that a newsletter would help to keep members update between meetings. An editor was appointed and after much agonising the editor's choice of 'Interim' as a title was agreed. Announcement of the commencement of Interim published in the LA Record had unexpected repercussions. Letters came flooding in asking for copies. The secretary regretfully informed those concerned, (except British Library and the National Library of Scotland), that the newsletter was for members only. The second issue proudly sported an ISSN. In the knowledge that our activities would be preserved for all time we felt that ASHSL had truly been launched as a professional group.

Periodicals Exchange Scheme

The Secretary has received a reply to her letter to the Library Association Medical Section (LAMS) expressing the Association's concern at the demise of the Periodicals Exchange Scheme. In his letter, Mr P.J. Bishop, the Section's secretary, says that while personally deploring the decision of the Wellcome Institute to cease the operation of the scheme, he well understands that they are no longer able to finance it, since it was costing about £1,000 per year to run. He goes on to say that some of the commercial drug company libraries might be willing to meet the cost of postage involved in sending out lists once a year and the and that the committee of LAMS is investigating this possibility. A further suggestion is that librarians attending meetings do so armed with lists of duplicate journals for distribution to colleagues.
